'Pop up' exhibition in Brodick

Thoughts in the Roots

Giuseppe Penone

In April, a special family occasion took me south to London for a few days and while I was there, I squeezed in a visit to the Serpentine Gallery (South) in Hyde Park to see this remarkable exhibition.

Born in Northern Italy in 1947, **Giuseppe Penone** was a key artist in the '**Arte Povera**' movement of the late 1960s and early 1970s. Literally translated as 'poor art' these artists, predominantly based in Turin, used 'humble' materials to create unconventional artworks through mixed media and performance.

The exhibition includes pieces from 1969 to the present day with some installations created this year within the gallery itself, prior to the exhibition opening.




Some pieces such as

A Occhi Chiusi

(With eyes closed)

150 x 510 x 8cm



Using hundreds of tiny acacia thorns to map out this huge image of closed eyes, Penone explores the relationship between sight and the act of closing one's eyes.

Alberi Libro

(Book Trees)

443.5 x 513 x 41cm



Using white fir, cedar and larch wood, this sculpture comprises twelve carved saplings standing side by side.

Planets

Antony Gormley

As I headed for St. Pancras station to begin my journey back to Arran, I came across **Antony Gormley's** installation **Planets** on the forecourt of the British Library. Installed in 2002, eight boulders placed on individual plinths are arranged in a circular formation. Human figures are carved into each one. Gormley personally selected these ancient stones (estimated to be 350 - 1,000 million years old) from a quarry in Sweden.



Ninth Street Women

Anyone who is interested in the American abstract expressionists and the way they changed the art world, will find **Ninth Street Women** by **Mary Gabriel** a very engaging read. It tells the story of five women at the heart of this art movement - Lee Krasner, Elaine de Kooning, Grace Hartigan, Joan Mitchell and Helen Frankenthaler. Together they also changed the public's perception of women artists and created opportunities for their successors.



Perhaps the best known of these five women is Lee Krasner who, recognising the reality of the male dominated art world, put her own ambitions to one side for many years, to ensure that the work of her husband, Jackson Pollock, would be given the recognition she believed it deserved.

'Death of an Artist' (Season 2 - Krasner and Pollock) is a podcast by Katy Hessel which explores the challenges of Krasner's relationship with Pollock, the events that led to his death and her tireless efforts to promote and raise the profile and value of his paintings.
